KIS students design website on sustainability and recycling

Two Korea International School students have launched a website to educate consumers on recycling ice packs as the school offers support for its members to carry out sustainability initiatives with its commitment to applied learning and service.

The website named Ice Pack Project, designed by two 12th grade students, Justin and Alex from KIS, is designed to educate consumers why it is important to recycle ice packs and where to recycle them. The duo believed more ice packs need to be recycled, as it is less expensive for businesses to purchase new ice packs than reusing them.

Gel-containing ice packs have proven to be challenging in being properly recycled, as they contain microplastics, which are harmful to ingest and not biodegradable.

The website the two students cre-

ated provides educational material on the environmental and economic impact of ice packs, and informs visitors of ice pack recycling dropoff sites near them. KIS said the two students were supported by KIS service and sustainability coordinator Nate Samuelson with a determination to help raise awareness of the issue and challenge consumers to assume more responsibility. The students also received help from another faculty adviser.

The school said it has helped students like Justin and Alex to focus on social contribution and responding to others with compassion under its emphasis on global citizenship, integrity, adaptability, balance in life and empowerment.

The school added it encourages students at all grade levels to use their knowledge and skills to help others, especially on sustainable service initiatives.

Thousands rally at Mar Menor

MADRID (AFP) — Tens of thousands of people formed a human chain around Spain's crisis-hit Mar Menor lagoon on Saturday in a show of mourning after tons of dead fish washed ashore, organizers and officials said.

One of Europe's largest saltwater lagoons, the Mar Menor has long been a draw for tourists but is slowly dying as a result of agricultural pollution, with millions of fish and crustaceans dying over the past fortnight.

Images of dead fish have traumatized this southeastern coastal region, with locals and tourists turning out to join the mass mourning.

Footage from the scene showed huge lines of people, many in beachwear, holding hands along the waterfront on Alcazares beach, which stretches 6 kilometers and other part of the lagoon's 73-kilometer shoreline.

"It was an act of mourning for the death of the animals ... we wanted people to somehow ask their forgiveness for the barbarity we've inflicted on them," Jesus Cutillas, one of the organizers told Agence France-Presse.

"For days, we've witnessed the death of millions and millions of fish and seeing all that unnecessary death hurts."

"The aim was to express our regret for what has happened and show our determination that it never happens again."

Many people wore black, others held up banners reading: SOS Mar Menor.

Organizers estimated up to 70,000 people joined the protest.

Experts say the fish suffocated due to a lack of oxygen caused by hundreds of tons of nitrates from fertilizers leak-

On Monday, regional officials said they had removed 4.5 to 5 metric tons of fish, but by Saturday that had risen threefold to 15 tons of fish and algae.

The 15 tons of dead fish and biomass (removed from the shore) show that this is indeed an environmental catastrophe and emergency. We need immediate help for the ecosystem," tweeted Noelia Arroyo, mayor of the nearby town of Cartagena.

Pedro Garcia, director of regional conservation organization ANSE, said this week that environmental groups

feared the marine death toll was more than twice the figure given on Monday by the authorities

"Within that 15-ton figure, there will certainly be at least two or three tons of dead vegetation, but we have no way of knowing for sure," he told AFP on Saturday.

At the lagoon on Wednesday, Environment Minister Teresa Ribera accused the regional government of turning a blind eye to farming irregularities in the Campo de Cartagena, a vast area of intensive agriculture that has grown tenfold over the past 40 years.

But agricultural groups insist they comply scrupulously with environmental legislation.

Incheon's annual rock festival to be held virtually in October

The annual Incheon Pentaport Rock Festival will be held virtually for the second consecutive year on Oct. 9 and 10, its organizers said Sunday.

The festival's 16th edition will feature '90s top artists such as Lee Seung-hwan and Yoon Sang, and other popular acts including 10cm, Daybreak and Leenalchi, according to the organizing committee.

The names of participating artists from other countries will be revealed at a later date.

As one of South Korea's biggest music events, the Incheon Pentaport Rock Festival was previously held in October, also virtually, after being postponed for two months due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Organizers said some 780,000 people watched the show online. (Yonhap)


